- *Experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity*
- *Living with substance use disorder (SUD), opioid use disorder (OUD), and co-occurring mental health challenges*

Volunteers served in the food pantry, clothing closet, shelter, chapel services, facilities maintenance, education support, and outreach—multiplying every dollar donated.

OUR RECOVERY & HOUSING PROGRAMS



From the Street to Your Feet - Men's & Women's Programs

Program Type: Recovery housing and high-impact opioid abatement

This Christ-centered, evidence-based program provides:

- **Safe, stable recovery housing**
- **Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT)** in coordination with providers
- **Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT)** and other evidence-based therapies
- **Certified Peer Support** and pastoral encouragement
- **Life skills, financial literacy, and work readiness**
- **Family counseling and reunification support**

Clients move from crisis to stability, work, and independent housing using our structured recovery pathway.

Four-Phase Recovery System

1. **Phase 1 - Immediate Stabilization & Foundational Support (Days 1-45)**
Detox and medical care through partners; intensive counseling; peer support; spiritual care; basic needs met.
2. **Phase 2 - Vocational Rehabilitation & Training (Months 1-6)**
 - GED and Adult High School
 - Computer and financial literacy
 - Career training (HVAC, welding, electrical, plumbing, CDL, lineman, construction trades, IT, EMT, etc.)

Delivered in partnership with **Richmond Community College**.
3. **Phase 3 - Leadership & Service (1-3 Months)**
Residents begin mentoring others, serving in community projects, and taking on leadership roles on campus.
4. **Phase 4 - Career Track & Housing Support**
Rapid rehousing strategies, assistance with deposits and utilities, connections to landlords and housing authorities, and long-term employment support and follow-up.

Daily Life on Campus

A typical weekday for residential participants includes:

- Morning devotions and personal care
- Campus maintenance, food pantry and clothing closet service, and ministries
- Lunch and fellowship
- Afternoon vocational training with RCC
- Supper together
- Evening certified counseling groups and peer support
- Lights out at 10 p.m. to support healthy sleep routines

This structure builds discipline, community, and readiness for work and independent living.

These funds, combined with ongoing support, are helping sustain and expand recovery housing and services.



PARTNERSHIPS THAT MAKE THIS POSSIBLE

RCRM relies on a strong network of partners, including:

- **Richmond Community College** - on-site adult education, GED/HSE, financial and computer literacy, life skills, and career training
- **Assurance Life Learning Center** - CARF-accredited counseling, certified alcohol and drug counseling, peer support
- **Sandhills Best Care** - primary care, behavioral health, Tailored Care Management, and MAT
- **Daymark Recovery Services** - 24/7 crisis services, ACT, DBT, PSR, SAIOP, assessment and referral
- **Goshen Medical Center** - primary care and mobile clinic services
- Local churches, civic groups, and businesses that donate, sponsor, and volunteer

Sustainability & What's Next

To ensure long-term impact for Richmond County, RCRM is:

- Developing **in-house billable clinical and peer services** to utilize Medicaid reimbursement
- Launching **participant-led vocational enterprises** (pressure washing, fencing, landscaping, moving) that create work experience and revenue
- Building a **Sponsorship and Development Department** to cultivate monthly donors, corporate partners, and event sponsors
- Expanding **grant-writing capacity** to secure multi-year state, federal, and foundation support
- Continuing to hire and train **program graduates** as peer support staff and leaders

Priorities for the Next Year

1. Increase the number of recovery housing beds for both men and women.
2. Grow vocational programs and social enterprises to support graduates entering the workforce.
3. Deepen data tracking and evaluation of recovery outcomes.
4. Strengthen collaborations with law enforcement, courts, and hospitals for earlier intervention and diversion.
5. Expand community engagement through church partnerships, volunteer recruitment, and donor campaigns.
